Approximately 2000 key women educators from 17 different countries gathered on July 16-20 at the JW Marriott Hotel. Austin, TX. Vermont was well rep-





ticspeakers, engaging workshops, daily blissful piano performances (Vermont's very own, Rita Corey, was opening night's pianist), delicious Texas beef at the Impacting Education Worldwide Luncheon, and addressing a myriad of amendment changes!

Uplifting keynote speaker, Nadia Lopez, author of <u>A Bridge to Brilliance</u>, chronicled how she began a school in Brooklyn, New York, and through her passion and hard work, changed the lives of her students, all living below the poverty level, resulting in a 98% graduation rate.

Stimulating is the word to describe <u>The Art of Possibility</u>'s author, Benjamin Zander, conductor of the Boston Philharmonic, who masterfully engaged us with his music and "Distinguished possibilities!"

L exas pioneer women's tales of their journey and the trials they endured on their way to starting a new life in the Texas republic were vividly recreated by three of their descendants during a standing-room-only breakout session.

Impressive women educators from across the globe were engaged in animated conversations, trading family stories, program ideas, and personal email addresses.

Nocturnal activities included pontoon viewing of 1.5 million bats, enjoying savory barbecue and being entertained by talented up-and-coming bands, but the best nighttime activity was when seven Vermont sisters and two husbands enjoyed dinner, laughs, and camaraderie on a 104° evening in sizzling Austin!



The 2019 DKG International Conference Theme will be Global Awareness and is scheduled to take place July 30-August 1 in Mashantucket, CT In 2007, White Nose Syndrome hit bat colonies in Vermont and wiped out massive populations of little brown bats around the state. Today, as much as 90 percent of the population of little brown bats in the Northeast has died and the entire eastern side of Vermont "pretty much has no little brown bat colonies anymore, and they used to be everywhere; hundreds — thousands of bats in a colony." {Alyssa Bennett, VT Fish & Wildlife}



My thoughts from the DKG International Convention Summer 2018 by Ann Kalinoski

We arrived in Austin to find the heat about the same as what we had left in VT. I Checked in with my husband and we went to see our room on the 23rd floor. We had time for a quick dinner before the opening night of Texas and the flag presentation but discovered the dining area had a 45 minute wait. We went to the bar to see what food we could find there. To my surprise, I discovered a Vermont DKG sister sitting at the corner of the bar, my first sister to meet at the convention: Sue Green of VT. Small world it is.

Imagine almost 1,700 + women in a hall, sitting in chairs that were not made to fit everyone. We sure got close to some of our sisters that night. While it was a very pleasant ceremony, I could not wait to get up and move. Those 1,700 sisters also had to share the elevators to floors 1 to 24, the restrooms and the eateries. You did have to wait for the next elevator often, but it gave you time to meet & greet more of your sisters. It was always fun to see how many we could get on board, sort of like how many could you get in a phone booth.

My first session was A Bucket full of Best Books about Bullving. Many great books were shown and briefly explained. We were introduced to the idea of using the word "target" not "victim" when referring to the person being bullied. I am still unclear of how I feel about this. "Target" is an object of abuse. "Victim" is a person who suffers from destructive actions or injury from actions. The sense was that by renaming victims "targets", they would better withstand abuse. I am not sure at this point that it would matter, but I plan to look into it further. A few of the books on display were: Bully by Patricia Polacco, Chester Raccoon and the Big Bad Bully by Audrey Penn, One by Kathryn Otoshi, and Bullied: What Every Parent, Teacher and Kid Needs to Know about Ending the Cycle of Fear by Carrie Goldman.

Carrie Goldman.

The I Don't Know How You Do It session discussed how teachers are expected to provide services for our students who have trauma in their life, to help them get to a better space, while at the same time teach them what they need to know. Nowadays, many children who attend school have experienced differing degrees of trauma in their lives which impacts their ability to learn. Our support as teachers may help them stay in school each day.

The Blue Eyed Doll: An Ambassador of Peace session revealed that in 1927 over 2,000 dolls were sent to Japan to be given out in schools. which we practiced and sang at the end of the presentation. With the advent of WWII, many of the Emily dolls were destroyed. Only approximately 100 are left in Japan now. The 2015 DKG Peace Education Project was initiated to tell the story of the dolls and promote world peace and understanding. The DKG sisters from Japan brought thousands of cranes to share with a high school in the Austin area.

In the **Chapter President Summit** the role of the chapter president was reviewed. Strategies such as keeping in touch with members by phone, setting up committees by pairs, organizing a booth at an event to get more members were discussed. Developing a library to hold Chapter records and historical information was touched on.

While the general meetings were the "meat" of the convention, the "potatoes" were the break-out sessions and the "gravy" proved to be the trips the Vermont group took in and around Austin. <u>Janis Kiehle Beta Chapter President Austin Highlights</u>

The convention was a fun but exhausting time! The J.W. Marriott was a great place for the convention with all the rooms in one area of the hotel spread out over three floors. The Texas delegation were great hosts!

Here are some highlights for me:

Global Awareness Forum: Teaching Tolerance and Promoting Peace

I was particularly impressed by Mansi Mehta from UNICEF who spoke about their initiatives in this area including Schools for Africa, and peace building curriculums that have been developed for early childhood and teenagers

Northeast Regional Breakfast: Monies were collected for the Emergency Fund and all the state presidents from the Northeast were honored!!!

Headquarters Tour: Rita Corey and I were able to tour DKG Headquarters located in Austin! Each group that went was accompanied by a tour guide. We were very impressed with the space which contained lots of beautiful art work. We saw the plaque with all the International Achievement Awardees listed and found Alice Carrier's name.

Celebration of Life Ceremony: <u>Alice Carrier</u> was one of four women who were remembered with speeches for their service to DKG. I read a piece written by Linn Wilson and then added my own words about <u>Alice</u>. It was a beautiful, touching ceremony.

Celebration Banquet: The final event is always a banquet. The 150 member chorus performed and the gavel was passed from the former president, Carolyn Pittman to the new president of DKG, Cathy Daugherty. All the new members of the board were honored.

Keeping chapters viable or B. Attracting and retaining members. Another workshop focused on maintaining and building the chapter through technology. There was a lot of information with a lot of options to communicate. I walked away with a whole list of different ways to communicate quickly with your chapter. This workshop also included how to do surveys to find out what members are thinking. I am excited about the possibilities for this.

Technology can help cut down on the need for a lot of meetings. I will say that the chapters and states that have too many meetings in a year are feeling the negative impact. Our own chapter only has 4 general meetings a year and if members cannot make it, we let them know what is happening. Going to the International Convention was everything I hoped it would be and more. I made some amazing new friends from Texas. Thanks to technology, I can stay in touch and draw on their experience, knowledge and advice.

The 2018 Vermont Alpha Lambda State Achievement Award was given to Claire Reczek in recognition of her distinguished and outstanding service to both Alpha Lambda State and her own Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma International Society. A member for 34 years, she is a true professional. As an educator, Claire served as Elementary and Secondary Reading Specialist and Coordinator in her district. Over the course of her teaching career, she received the following awards: Outstanding Bennington Rutland Supervisory Union Teacher 1991 and in 1995: Outstanding Vermont Teacher. In her Chapter she served as an Executive Board Member, Communication Chair, Personal Development Chair, member of the Initiation Committee and receiving the Women of Distinction Award in 2005. In 2004, she Co-chaired the Alpha Lambda Spring Convention at which time she created a slide presentation about Vermont's Alpha Lambda State Founders which she later distributed to all DKG Chapters in Vermont. Claire also was the recipient of 2 Enrichment Grants. One grant helped to fund a trip to Italy and Greece in 1996 resulting in a slide show she presented to local schools. Outstanding Service to Education Award Leatrice Potter, Plainfield, VT (above) significant contribution to education without thought of recompense. The person <u>cannot</u> be a licensed teacher or a member of Delta Kappa Gamma. The winner for 2018 was Leatrice Potter of East Montpelier, nominated by Marilyn Wallace of Delta Chapter. Leatrice had been a "teacher's aide" at Twinfield Elementary in the 1980s, grades 1-5. When the elementary school moved to the new wing attached to Twinfield High School, she remained as a "para" for grades 1 and 2. Her own children had attended the school, so she was well known to teachers and staff. When the school bought a popcorn machine, Leatrice and a friend made popcorn to sell at school on Fridays. After retiring from her para position, she returned to the school as a "lunch lady", and at age 80, she is still there, and walks to school three miles each way whenever possible. Susan has been a freelance artist and teacher for over thirty years and since 1996 has been a member of the faculty of the Adult Degree Program of Vermont College, where she advises studies in Art and Natural Science. She also worked for the Vermont Institute of Natural Science for thirteen years as an educator, naturalist, and illustrator. Her particular interests include plants, insects, and all kinds of wet places – vernal pools, fens, bogs, and beaver meadows – and making art that reflects her love of nature. She's insatiably curious, loves a puzzle, thinks observation and imagination are the beginning of both science and art, and believes in having lots of fun while learning about the natural world. Susan earned a BA in Graphics and Natural History from New College, Sarasota, Florida and a Master of Fine Arts in visual art from Vermont College. She also holds a Diploma in Botanical Art from the Society of Botanical Artists in London. "My practice as an artist has changed over the years from printmaking to many years of making abstract art quilts, to my current work on paper, using watercolor, pencil, ink and silverpoint. Most of my work is of the details of the natural world. I'm interested in making pictures, often very close-up, of native plants and invertebrates." Susan informed us. 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SOME IMPORTANT CHANGES

At the International Convention in Austin, several changes concerning membership occurred.

1. We now use the word "induct" rather than the word "initiate". (Constitution III.A.1&2)

2. A new member becomes a member of the International Society in addition to a state organization and/or a chapter. (Constitution III.A.1)

3. An individual becomes a member of the Society when she pays her dues rather than when she is inducted. (Constitution III.A.1.&2)

4. The requirement of being initiated within one year of paying dues is no longer valid. (Standing Rules 3.01)

5. Membership is open not only to active and retired educators but also to anyone who has ever taught. (Constitution III.B.1)

6. Add "Member Emerita" to the types of membership (active, reserve, and honorary). Chapters may apply for Emerita status for members who have served the Society for fifty years or more. Members granted this status shall not pay dues or receive any publications. However, they will be eligible for recognition/remembrance at all levels of the Society. (Constitution III.B.4)

7. Add "Collegiate Members" to the types of membership. Collegiate members must be in last two years of undergraduate work or have graduate standing. When a collegiate member starts her career as a paid educator, she will pay active member dues and become an active member. If a collegiate member does not pursue a career in education or drops from an educational degree program, her membership expires. International dues will be \$20. A collegiate member may participate in all activities of the Society except holding an elected office. (Constitution

III.B.4, Standing Rules 3.4 and 4.11)

8. Chapters may select candidates for members by the method determined by the chapter. However, the method must be established by the chapter rules. (Constitution III.C.1)
