Purposes of DKGIEF

1. Support and encourage intercultural understanding 2. Encourage standards of excellence in education 3.Assist and cooperate with schools, colleges, universities, and other persons, organizations, trust funds, or foundations in support, encouragement, and improvement of education. The Foundation Supports -*Coronetet Individual Award, *Educational Projects, Educator's Award Fund, *Emergency Fund, Holden Leadership Project, Golden Gift Fund, International Speakers Fund, *Scholarship fund, World Fellowship.

*Coronetet Individual Awards Individual Professional Development & Educational Seminars. As of February 2020 over \$801,200 have been granted for Individual Awards.

Applications must be submitted electronically by May 1 and November 1

*Educational Project Award

1. Must comply with one or more of the following: a.support and encourage intercultural understanding, b.encourage standards of excellence in education and/or c.assist and cooperate with schools, colleges, universities and other persons, organizations, trust funds, or foundations in support, encouragement, and improvement of education. 2.A total of \$50,000 was funded to new and renewal projects in February 2020. In total DKGIEF has awarded over \$3,328,908 to groups or individuals for projects to benefit children and education.

Applications must be submitted electronically by March 1. Application forms may be obtained between July 1 - January 3

Applicants may apply for a second year.

Educator's Award: Supports Educator's Book Award

*Emergency Fund: Supports members who sustain major losses from floods, wild fires and other natural disasters. Members are recommended by their chapter and state presidents. Contact your chapter presidents if you need financial assistance and you can receive up to \$500.

Holden Fund: Offers diversity by offering a variety of opportunities for members.

- 2.International Convention speakers who are not members
- 3. Parliamentary Training
- 4. Transition Meetings
- 5.International leader Orientation

Golden Gift Fund: Offers a weeklong leadership training, "Ignite: Leaders Empowering Leaders Program"

**Scholarship Fund: As many as 31 scholarships are awarded each year to members pursuing advanced degrees. \$10,000 for a doctorate and \$6,000 for other advanced degree.

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<u>International World Fellowship</u>

Fund: Provides opportunities for students from abroad to study in the United States and Canada. Nine-hundred eighty-six women from 122 countries have received awards totaling \$3,699,600 since 1960.

We are a group of key women educators, 219 **strong** in VT, among an International community of 62,000.

What impetus birthed DKG? History shows that women's progress resulted from advocacy. The founders created DKG as a vehicle for self-advocacy. Fund Fact Friday on Facebook states, "In the first 10 years of DKG's existence, the society grew from one state with 17 chapters and 431 members to 35 states with 322 chapters and 10,002 members!"

We have come a long way, and the millennials are the product of improved conditions, but we have more to do as the road is long and there will always be ways to grow and improve, problems to solve, people to help.

At the leadership training in Atlanta this summer, I met women from many states who are in charge of the state membership committee. As such we grew personally from our newfound friendships and we grew professionally by learning about our roles, our tasks, our

Society, and how to improve and practice our leadership skills. Some of the topics we covered include how to navigate the website (filled with much information on all topics), how to access the website and assist members in updating their information, how to assist chapter membership chairs (which includes reaching new members, informing new members, mentoring new members, encouraging current members to participate in programs and projects pertinent to their chapter.) 

Norma McShane of Eta, the chapter I was first inducted into, was a UVM extension agent for Bennington County (if I remember correctly). She gave an educational presentation to my class of special needs high school

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- · Thanks to the work of Mary Ann Riggie and our previous Rules Committee Delta Kappa Gamma International approved Vermont's Bylaws and Standing Rules, *July 2021*
- · Members can now find 2021 amended and approved Bylaws and Standing Rules at our **DKG VT website**. All members are encouraged to read these. Officers and Committees will find their purposes and responsibilities therein.
- ·Article VIII, Section C, 1-h-2 states: "(The Rules Committee shall) distribute current Vermont Bylaws and Standing Rules to the state Executive Board members by the state fall Executive Board meeting in odd-numbered years." This distribution occurred on 9.23.21. This means that the president of each chapter received a copy. Members may access the current set at the DKG VT website.
- ·Article VIII, Section C, 1-h-3 states: "(The Rules Committee shall) review chapter rules each biennium." The Rules Committee will begin this process after the Fall Executive Board Meeting. In light of the newly approved State Bylaws and Standing Rules each chapter will need to review its Bylaws and Standing Rules to determine if changes are needed to its own document. Chapters may contact Martha Fleming, this biennium's State Rules Chair, for a list of the updated changes made to the State Bylaws and Standing Rules. (marthafleming328@gmail.com)






